Since 2002, the team of over 50 members strong has reached the South Jersey Debate League championships nine times and has brought the championship home five times. Math League

The Math League is dedicated to bringing challenging mathematics materials to students. Students in Math League compete for the highest scores, while schools compete for the highest team score. These contests consist of 12 High School Contests each year. All high school students are welcome to compete. Problems draw from a wide range of high school topics: geometry, algebra, trigonometry, logarithms, series, sequences, exponents, roots, integers, real numbers, combinations, probability, coordinate geometry, and more. No knowledge of calculus is required to solve any of these problems. Working through these problems and our contest problem books is excellent practice for the SAT and college-bound students

Mock Trial Team

Mock Trial consists of two teams of 2 student lawyers and three student witnesses (a total of 10 starting roles). The state of New Jersey provides every high school with copies of one fictional case that we prepare and compete against other schools. The winner is determined by a judge who rates the lawyer and witness performances on a scale of 1-10. Other team members have "back-up" roles and are jurors or bailiffs, as needed. The season runs from the last week in October to the first week in February. The team will meet every Tuesday and Thursday after school from 2:20-4:00. The matches take place on Saturdays from 7:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. in late January and early February.

National Honor Society

National Honor Society (NHS) is an organization devoted to acknowledging high school students who have excelled in four characteristics during their high school years. These four characteristics are Leadership, Service, Character, and Scholarship. NHS members make every effort to work for the betterment of their community.

Every high school that is part of NHS has its own set of rules and standards that are approved by the school board. In addition, each state that has schools that are part of NHS has a state board and state advisors. The job of the state advisors is to make sure that each school follows the national charter of the National Honor Society.

Any Junior achieving a cumulative, unweighted, grade of exactly 90 or higher at the completion of the second marking period and midterm exams (S2) shall be eligible to be considered for the selection of National Honor Society. Secondly, they must exhibit outstanding leadership qualities, character, and service during their years in high school. Once the student becomes a member, they must retain their GPA and attend all NHS meetings as well as complete a service requirement during the school year. We meet with our officers on the last Tuesday of the month.

NJDFL (Team Theatre)

Team Theatre participates in competitions sponsored by member schools of the New Jersey Drama and Forensics League. Competition categories include both acting and public speaking events. The competitions are on Saturdays from December-February, and auditions for the team are held in October. Students select their own material and rehearse with the coaches and team captains to prepare for the competitions. Robotics Club

Eastern High School's robotics program is a team that competes in the highly competitive First Robotics Competition. The program is designed to build strong student leaders and inspire high school students to enter the fields of engineering and science.

The students design, build, and test a robot that must complete a series of given tasks. The specific tasks in any given year are released in early January, immediately followed by a six week build season. During the build season, the club meets Mondays-Saturdays to build a complete robot. With guidance from the teacher-mentors, the students take ownership of the project through all stages and work collaboratively to see the project through to completion. Students are divided up into sub-groups with different focuses, including designers, builders, programmers, electricians, and public relations experts. Each sub-group must work and communicate well with the others in order to successfully complete the robot. Following the six-week build season, the club travels to two or three competitions which are typically on weekends in March and April.

School Musical / Director

The theater club encompasses almost all of the theater activities here at Eastern. It produces, annually, the Fall Play, Spring Musical, and One-Act Play festival. The theater club also has two semi-annual Broadway cabarets that allows students a smaller and more intimate venue to perform. Students can also participate in the stage crew that constructs the sets for the plays as well as various other crews including costumes, props, ushering and publicity for the various theatrical events.

School Newspaper

The School Newspaper (The Voyager) is a co-curricular activity whose main mission is to publish the school newspaper. The Voyager, once a month, Students may take the course for three years, starting as sophomores as a Journalism I student. The course is designed for those who love writing, and would love their writing to improve. Students also get real-life experience through in-depth reporting, interviewing, and researching skills. Students also learn Photoshop and Adobe InDesign. The school newspaper is a high-profile activity where the whole school, has the ability to read what you write – and have fun while doing so. The Voyager staff is a close-knit staff that acts like a real newsroom, with a variety of duties. Students who do not take the course may still be apart of the activity by coming to our open meetings twice a month.

We meet after school every 2nd and 4th Thursday in Room 605. Times are published on school calendar and on ETV announcements. We publish the paper toward the beginning of each month, starting in October.

Science League Club

The Sociedad Honoraria Hispánica is a national and international academic honor society sponsored by the American Association of Spanish and Portuguese, Inc. (AATSP).

The purpose of the Society is to recognize high achievement in Spanish and Portuguese by students of secondary schools and to promote continuity of interest in Hispanic and Luso-Brazilian studies. In order to qualify for the Society, students must be juniors or seniors, in Spanish III, IV or AP, with at least a 92% average of all of the Spanish courses taken at Eastern.

Officers are elected in September and must be enrolled in Spanish IV or AP for their Senior year. Fundraising, charitable, and cultural activities are held throughout the year. Members also provide tutoring for students in Spanish I and II.
